

Stumbling into the New Year

with a few "flops" ... and not just flip-flops

t's been a tough month for Folly Beach, and not just because January stretched out into five calendar weeks this year

A much-hyped but ultimately failed New Year's Eve drone show in lieu of traditional explosives went out with a fizzle as drones inexplicably began falling from the sky. Then, a local pizzeria's annual Meatball Drop, a quirky but beloved tradition on Folly, was halted by Folly Beach Public Safety for impeding on the public right-of-way. Of course, there was the island's annual Flip-flop Drop, too, which actually went off without a hitch but, in a way, served as a symbol for an evening full of flops.

Then 2025 arrived and things started looking up until a rare snowstorm postponed island's signature January street

event, Taste of Folly. It was moved twice due to weather-first rain, then snow and ice. But Taste of Folly was rescheduled for Saturday, Feb. 1 (after press time), so maybe the black cloud is finally passing over our little island. But let's look back at what went wrong on a New Year's Eve on Folly that was unforgettable for all the wrong reasons.

On Dec. 31, 2024, thousands of people gathered along and around Center Street to witness what was going to be the area's first drone show, a new technological concept to

replace traditional explosive pyrotechnics that are quieter, more environmentallyfriendly and customized, with unique designs transforming in mid-air.

The Folly Association of Business (FAB) spent considerably more money to hire Lightyear Drones to produce the drone show than it would a typical fireworks company. Those who were lucky enough to be outside on Dec. 30 were able to witness the rehearsal test launch show that included several nods to Folly Beach with beachy scenes and animals.

On New Year's Eve, everyone waited with bated breath as the drones were launched at 7 p.m. over the Folly River. The first drones whizzed into the sky, illuminating a Morris Island lighthouse, and then the design transformed into a dolphin.

And then, the sky went dark.

Puzzled revelers were left scratching their heads over if the show would return to the skies. When the show didn't return after around ten minutes, word got out that there was a problem and the show would not go on.

Onlookers missed out on one of the more traditional celebrations for the new year. A few personal, rogue fireworks were launched a few minutes later over the Folly River, which turned out to be an unwitting consolation prize.

The evening news soon reported on a most unfortunate event: a person was struck by a falling drone, sustaining minor injuries.

Kelly Travers, the FAB Event Coordinator, said that "upper-level windshear" on New Year's Eve led to the failure of the show, forcing the "ultimate decision to ground

"The formal investigation by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) is ongoing. This display was fully insured, and we do sincerely regret the minor injury that was treated and released onsite," Travers said. "All large displays do come with risk and we will be carefully considering how we move forward with future displays."

She added that the organization interviewed several companies before deciding on Lightyear Drones, working closely with the company on the location, requirements, permits, security, and insurance.

While the lack of a proper light show was disappointing, revelers made the most of the evening, popping into Center Street bars and restaurants to await other Folly-specific New Year's Eve traditions: The Flip-Flop Drop, where a lighted flip flop descends from a fire truck outside the Tides Hotel when the clock strikes midnight, and the rag-tag Meatball Drop, held outside Woody's Pizza on Center Street. (editorial note: Since New Year's Eve, Woody's has sold and is under new ownership).

That's when another kerfuffle occurred namely, Public Safety's involvement in stopping the Meatball Drop from being held outside the restaurant, where it has taken place for the last 20 years. Folly Beach Public Safety has deemed the location over the Center Street sidewalk to be unsafe and declared the Meatball Drop an unpermitted special event that negatively impacted the public right-of-way.

"I, along with three of the previous community coordinators, were merely attempting to get (the former owners) to comply with the City of Folly Beach special event ordinance (needed for anything that) impacts public resources or are on public property, such as the right of way, sidewalk, or spilling out into the street as the event had done," stated chief Andrew Gilreath, director of Public Safety, adding that there have been issues, concerns, and conversations about the popularity of the event since the year 2018.

"One of my staff went to the restaurant well in advance to let them know the event was non-compliant, and they chose to try and have it anyway," Chief Gilreath stated. "Quite honestly, the least of (the former owner's)

worries was us not allowing him to continue He could have faced thousands of dollars in fines over the years in addition to this year (Officers) instead allowed (the owner) a way to host the event in a different manner that was a less egregious violation of the ordinance."

The public safety involvement in the "Meatball Drop" did not result in any officia police reports or arrests, but did not escape criticism on social media.

Finally, just over two weeks later, the scheduled Taste of Folly, also organized and executed by FAB, encountered a very rainy day forecasted for Saturday, Jan. 18's Salty Saturday, so FAB postponed the street event to the following Saturday, the original rain date pre-approved by City Council. Then, less than a week later, Folly Beach, like the rest of the Southeast, was blanketed in snow from the streets to the shore in what meteorologists called the rarest of winter storms. Snow stayed on the roads and beach for nearly a week, closing Charleston-area bridges, roads and businesses.

While the snow was a marvelous and rare photo opportunity, it forced another postponement of one of the season's larges street events, another blow to the FAB event organizers.

Thankfully, the pivot was quick and FAB rescheduled their "Savory Saturday" event for the following Saturday, Feb. 1 (after press time) to celebrate the delicious food and cocktails offered by local bars and restaurants, but it was not without its challenges. Travers had to scramble to procure vendors, volunteers bands, barricades, and all the other things that was originally reserved for two weeks prior. It was welcome news for many local businesses that lost money from having to close due to

Brave the Cold, Warm the Heart

America's biggest pants-free run for a cure returns to Folly Beach on Feb. 15

n February, thousands of bold, pants-less participants will hit the streets in dozens cities across the U.S. for the annual Cupid's Undie Run, a one-of-a-kind fundraiser for the Children's Tumor Foundation (CTF). On Folly Beach, the Cupid Undie Run returns on Saturday, Feb. 1. This unforgettable event raises awareness for Neurofibromatosisis (NF) and funds vital research to combat the rare genetic condition that causes tumors to grow all over the body.

Neurofibromatosis affects 1 in 2,000 births, which is about 4 million people worldwide. Anyone can be born with NF across all populations, and it affects everyone differently. NF can cause a wide range of systems, including blindness, deafness, bone abnormalities, disfigurement, learning challenges, disabling pain, or cancer.

From a single run in Washington, D.C. in 2010, Cupid's Undie Run has grown to a joy-filled, national fundraising phenomenon with tens of thousands in the fight against NF. In addition to Folly Beach's Cupid Undie Run, there are 37 other cities, from Boston to Orlando, New York to Los Angeles, and dozens

of cities in between. Fearless fundraisers will run and walk while wearing eye-catching outfits, everything from superhero undies to laugh-out-loud costumes.

The day kicks off at noon with music, mingling, and a drink (or two) at Loggerhead's Beach Grill, followed by a "brief" one-mile(ish) jog on the beach around 2 p.m., and then returning to Loggerhead's for an epic dance party to top it all off, celebrating the best costumes and top fundraisers. Participants are encouraged to let their personalities shine, whether it's in their favorite undies, PJ's, or a creative costume.

This year, Cupid's Undie Run is fueled by the support of two companies: National Underwear Partners Woxer and Pair of Thieves, both back for a second year to help make Cupid's Undie Run a success in its effort to end NF.






DECEMBER 19

THEFT

A woman walked into police headquarters to make a report regarding items that were stolen from the beach, specifically her keys, and added that she believed she was being scammed and overcharged by a locksmith. Officers pointed out that the woman paid for the service and had agreed to the price so that nothing could be done for that complaint but that a police report would be filed, and her keys were listed as stolen.

DECEMBER 20

TRAFFIC STOP

Officers conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle that had expired registration, and the female driver was unable to provide proof of registration or current proof of insurance. The woman attempted to call her insurance provider, but the company stated that she did not have a current policy. She was cited for expired registration and operating an uninsured vehicle, which was towed.

DECEMBER 28

VANDALISM

Officers responded to a residence where a man and woman noticed that their car tire was slashed multiple times. The residence does have a security camera, but a large tree blocked the view of the vehicle during the vandalism. They denied having any issues with anyone in the area, and we're unsure who committed the act.

DECEMBER 31 TRAFFIC STOP

Officers arrested a 33-year-old man for driving with a suspended license and expired registration after officers pulled him over for an expired tag. The man initially said that he did not have his driver's license and presented officers with his passport. When officers asked to clarify what he meant about his license, he stated, "My driver's license was taken away." Both the vehicle tag and the man's name and date of birth was run through dispatch for a records check, and it was discovered that his driver's license had been "suspended indefinitely" as of April 2024 and that he was arrested in November 2024 for driving with a suspended license. After reviewing his driving record, which showed an extensive amount of "failure to pay" traffic ticket violations and suspensions over the past two years, he was placed under arrest. A friend was allowed to come to the scene to take possession of the numerous musical instruments in the trunk of the vehicle before it was towed.

JANUARY 1 DISORDERLY CONDUCT/OPEN CONTAINER

While on special event patrol the night of New Year's Eve, an officer watched a man walk out of a Center Street bar holding a plastic cup that contained a yellow beverage consistent with beer. Officers asked the man to dump out his alcohol, and he acknowledged officers by shaking his head yes and waving at officers, yet he walked by a trashcan, looked back at officers, and kept on walking with the full cup. Officers contacted a 52-year-old man, who had slurred speech, glassy eyes, and was unsteady on his feet. He was arrested for disorderly conduct

JANUARY 2

PUBLIC INTOXICATION

At 12:45 a.m., following New Year's Eve event, officers observed a man who appeared to be intoxicated in the roadway on Center Street. The man was with a group of people, and officers ordered him to get on the sidewalk. The man returned to the sidewalk but then veered back into the roadway, unable to keep up with his group. Officers approached him, and members of the group became boisterous and were told

to back away. The man was escorted to the police station, where he called the situation "extra" and said that he was "only about a foot or two in the roadway." When officers reminded him that he failed to follow a simple order regarding his own safety, he seemed to understand, and instead of arresting him, the man was issued a summons citation for public intoxication. He was allowed to contact a sober friend for a ride home.

JANUARY 3

TRAFFIC STOP

Officers pulled over a vehicle for an expired decal and after "a generous amount of time," the driver could also not show proof of insurance coverage. The driver was issued citations for expired registration and operating an uninsured motor vehicle and his vehicle was towed.

JANUARY 4

THEFT OF MOTOR VEHICLE

A woman called to report that her car had been stolen. The woman said she invited friends on her boat for the day and when they all got off the boat, she believes the son of her friend took her car keys from her coat and stole her vehicle. She said the son had done things like that in the past with other people. The vehicle information was run through dispatch and the vehicle was seen leaving the island about a half an hour after the boat got back to the dock. A "be on the lookout" was issued to the surrounding agencies and the vehicle was entered as stolen.

JANUARY 4

TOWED VEHICLE

Around 2:30 p.m., an unoccupied vehicle was towed after the owner of a local moped rental company reported it was parked in front of their driveway in front of a clearly visible "no parking" sign and was obstructing access, preventing the company from moving any of their rental vehicles. It was towed away from the scene.

JANUARY 5

HIT-AND-RUN

Officers on patrol arrested a 50-yearold woman after observing her back into a parked, unoccupied vehicle and drive away. The woman was stopped and arrested for leaving the scene. When asked why she was attempting to drive away from the scene of an accident, she told officers she thought she had hit a trashcan. There was damage to both vehicles, including damage to the front left side and wheel area of the vehicle the woman hit. When asked if she had anything to drink, the woman said she had one drink and one shot several hours before. Officers were able to contact the owner of the struck vehicle, who was given an accident report to save his insurance company. The woman's vehicle was towed.

JANUARY 13


DRIVING UNDER SUSPENSION


Officers on patrol observed a vehicle with an expired registration. Officers ran the vehicle information, which showed the tag was suspended and also registered to a different make and model vehicle—another vehicle was also listed as suspended. The 27-year-old driver was placed under arrest for driving under suspension, failure to surrender plates, and improper vehicle license.

JANUARY 19

PUBLIC INTOXICATION

At 1:30 a.m., while sitting stationary in a patrol car in the median of Center Street, officers observed an intoxicated male walking in the roadway, unsteady on his feet and swaying. Officers instructed the man four times to get out of the roadway for his own safety, to which he responded, "I'm not in the road; I'm on the curb." The man then approached the patrol vehicle and stood in front of the driver's side door, preventing officers from getting out of the vehicle. When officers asked for his ID, he ignored officers, began walking away, and fell into a nearby flowerbed as officers were attempting to place him in custody. The man became unruly, pushed off the patrol vehicle, and attempted to turn around while being handcuffed. He had to be further restrained and was resisting arrest when officers reminded him how many times they asked him to get out of the roadway. He admitted they asked him multiple times and then said, "I was a d*ck to you, and I am a d*ck." The man eventually became cooperative and apologized, and officers allowed him to contact a sober friend who picked him up from the scene. He was cited for public intoxication and resisting arrest.



The Long Road to 'Suffering'

Malin Wagnon releases long-awaited debut album

ocal music man Malin Wagnon admits that some lyrics and melodies in his songs on his newly-released album Suffering date back to writings of his from the '90s. At that time, he was a coming-ofage songwriter in Birmingham, AL. Years later, in March of 2021, Suffering was recorded live at Fairweather Studio just off of Folly Beach.

The studio is owned by local percussionist and Bert's Market proprietor Omar Colon. It would be almost another four years after that, and Suffering was finally completed. Released at the end of last year, the long-awaited debut album is chockful of heartfelt songs and great musicianship that speaks to listeners through reflective, existential lyrics and moving instrumentals.

"Omar played a huge role in our recording process ... he was the sixth member of the band, our conductor, producer, and psychoanalyst," Wagnon says.

Drawing inspiration from The Basement Tapes by Bob Dylan and The Band as well as Cowboy Junkie's The Trinity Sessions, Wagnon says he chose to record all instruments and vocals on Suffering simultaneously at Fairweather Studio. All the musicians involved gathered around two microphones while recording the songs. Although Wagnon says he felt pressure and found the recording process to be intense, the studio atmosphere at Fairweather formed a fitting nest for the folky-roots album they created there.

Local percussionist Marshall Hudson of the Charleston-based band Susto plays drums on Suffering. Wagnon claims that Hudson had some revolutionary thoughts that helped steer the direction of the album.

"They got ahold of these songs I wrote and started pushing it in different directions and took it into areas I could have never predicted," says Wagnon.



Whitt Algar of Sideshow Americans plays the mellotron on most songs on Suffering. The mellotron is an organ-like keyboard that uses magnetic tape spools to generate realistic acoustic sounds. Wagnon jokes that Algar sounds so good that "He makes me sick." Algar helped Wagnon transform the title track, "Suffering," into an emotionally-driven, retrospective tune about Wagnon's childhood.

Regular musical collaborator and bassist Alan Shmitt joined Wagnon on recording Suffering, along with guitarist Jeff Davis, who contributed on electric guitar and lap steel. Davis plays a profound guitar solo in the blues song "Shelter of Arms," and his rare skill of playing lap steel sets a beautiful tone for the album's opening titled "The Elevator Game."

"He really killed it," says Wagnon of Davis' sound on the track. Wagnon tells the story of how he wrote the song after he had a dream in which Black Sabbath's Ronnie James Dio recognized him.

Although asking a songwriter to pick their favorite song is akin to asking a parent to choose their favorite child, Wagnon obliges

when asked what's his favorite track on Suffering.

"If I had to pick one, I'd probably pick 'The Flood'," he says thoughtfully. "It's a good example of the height—when everybody's hitting all cylinders."

James Anderson of Staggers & Jags plays fiddle while Cory Jarrett of Sideshow Americans plays banjo on "The Flood," which was written about perhaps the most famous flood of all, the one that involved an arc, a man named Noah, and a lot of animals

Wagnon's wife, Kevin Wagnon, sings harmonies and backup vocals on the love song "Sky's For Flying."

"She has a very natural ear for music," says Wagnon about the collaboration.


While he wrote the song "Caulder Run" after moving to Charleston in 2001 and being awakened by the tide after a long night of drinking on Folly Beach, the tune "A Glass of White" was written about Wagnon's friends going through a divorce and their self-medication of various substances. Algar plays piano in that tune while Wagnon strums an acoustic guitar and Davis soothes with his lap steel. "The Tipping Point" is a darker, brooding number, which Wagnon says many listeners can relate. The closing song of Suffering, titled "High," weaves a tale of Wagnon's love/hate relationship with marijuana.

Wagnon regularly plays eclectic sets at The Drop-In Bar & Deli in a trio they call Baeyoncé along with percussionist Stratton Moore of satirical pop band Sexbruise? and bassist Buzz Busby.

A Real Slice of Folly

It's a family affair for the new owners of popular Center Street pizza shop

rom a tiny Center Street storefront, Slice of Folly has been slinging piping-hot slices of cheese and pepperoni to visitors and locals for the last eight years. For

a large part of that time, local twin teenagers Thomas and Henry Hastings have been right there, making the pizzas, serving customers, helping and do all the little things that go into running a pizzeria in a busy beach Their parents,

Matt and Sarah-Hamlin Hastings, say they never really planned on owning a restaurant, and they surely never thought their youngest boys' summer jobs would end up being a family business. But that's exactly what happened last year when the Folly couple had the opportunity to buy the busy Center Street pizza shop.

Although they purchased the business in August of 2024, the Hastings largely kept their venture quiet, even amongst friends and extended family. With the help of Thomas and Henry, who knew the business well, the couple spent the last several months tweaking some things and ironing out all of the kinks. Then, last month, they revealed to everyone that they were the proud owners of Slice of Folly.

"We wanted to learn the equipment and see what works and what doesn't," says Sarah-Hamlin. "We wanted to be able to serve a consistent product every time, so when people come in, they know what they're getting and that it's going to be good."

According to Sarah-Hamlin, they needed

to get back to the basics with what Slice offered, which meant cutting certain things from the menu, like subs and salads. They wanted to just focus on the pizza.

"As we get some of our processes upgraded, as we transition into the summer, we're excited about exploring specials, promotions, and things that will keep Slice fun," says Matt. Sarah-Hamlin adds that the boys have been experimenting with weekly specials, like the Double-Pep & Hot Honey pie or the controversial Pickle-Bacon-Ranch pizza that people either loved or thought was blasphemous.

Besides twins Thomas and Henry, the Hastings have two other sons, one who graduated from USC and now lives in Utah and another who currently attends

"It's been very cool. A real family affair," explains Sarah-Hamlin, interior designer and owner of Fritz Porter Design Collective, a boutique textiles and hand-crafted furniture showroom located in North Charleston. She says her husband Matt is the numbers guy and she used her expertise in revamping the design of the tiny pizza shop and led a redesign of the company's colors and logos. "It really wasn't a dream. But we

"What we didn't anticipate, but makes it even better, is that our boys are who led us to Slice," says Matt. "All of them have worked summers at Folly through the years. Our son Henry's first summer job was at Slice back when he was 15. His brother Thomas followed suit, working at Slice, and Coconut Joes last summer. Charlie has been a lifequard on Folly for several summers, and our oldest, Jack, worked at Taco Boy all during high school and college. So we know the summer crowds and their eating habits well!"

The pizza industry may be relatively new to the Hastings, but pizza is not. Sarah-Hamlin native Virginian, while the two were living in New York. The couple spent many years in New York and Connecticut, two of the best pizza regions in the country (calm down, Chicago!). Then, several years ago, they decided to move south to Sarah-Hamlin's hometown of Charleston. Eventually, they moved out to Folly Beach full-time.

"Since acquiring Slice in August, we're focused on every aspect of the business, which, of course, starts with our cheese. I'd love to make our own Mozzarella, but our small space makes that difficult," says Matt. "We're ordering the best cheese and most expensive cheese available. We're committed to the cheesiest experience for








Will My Freeze-amaged Plant Survive?



ello Friends, as I'm writing this there is still snow on the ground outside my house. Don't get me wrong, we had a blast throwing snowballs, sliding down slopes on our boogie boards, (they work great!) building snow statues, (they didn't resemble people so much,) etc.

Then the reality of not being able to get to some appointments _and me wiping out walking onto an ice patch and nearly breaking my arm and ribs) hit. Still, I'm grateful for the rare chance to be in some snow. Right away I started getting questions from people about plant material that didn't get covered in time and so on.

Well, that really depends on a lot of factors and a reminder that I'm not an expert. I'm just a curious human being that will try to share tidbits I've learned

or am still learning.

According to our in state source Clemson Extension service:

"Once our plants begin to thaw out, we may be able to tell if they made it, but things that die back to the ground could re-sprout in spring. Normally evergreen shrubs and trees can also lose leaves and look dead, but they may flush back out. It is always acceptable to remove dead or broken limbs/branches. Avoid heavy pruning until the end of February or early March."

I've personally seen this happen a bunch. For example, I have a Meyer lemon tree that got hit hard a few years ago, lost all of its leaves and even died back practically to the main trunk, and later that spring snapped back with lots of growth.

The snow that's laying around the plants can even insulate them, warming the soil underneath, of course there's the downfall of heavy snow and ice breaking branches. Mulching prior to cold weather would appear to help insulate as well. I always like to water at the roots before a freeze as the cold temperatures can dry a plant out fast.

More from Clemson: "The signs of cold damage can be confusing, since some damage may not be evident until months later. Leaves and tender shoots subjected to freezing temperatures appear water-soaked and wilted. These tissues will usually turn black within a few hours or days."

As far as what to do to help the plant along until spring, other than cutting obvious broken branches and occasional watering when they dry out, we're all kind of playing the waiting game.

Keep in mind there are so many plants with different needs and in different circumstances it's impossible to say exactly other than, be vigilant, do research on the plants you're concerned about and always keep an open mind! Good luck! Love and Aloha!






